A BRIEF HISTORY



Christ Methodist Episcopal Church was one of Pittsburgh's largest churches during the late 1800's. The church was located on Penn Avenue and Hancock Street (now 8th Street) in downtown Pittsburgh.

On May 5, 1891, tragedy struck when fire destroyed Christ Methodist Church and the adjacent Pittsburgh Female College were destroyed by fire. Following the disaster, the congregation used the Bijou Theater for Sunday services.

On May 28, 1891, three weeks after the fire, the Trustees decided to rebuild the church... but where? This quote from the minutes of that meeting set the wheels in motion, "We refuse to rebuild in the midst of dirty, filthy Pittsburgh." The congregation decided to split and move to the "suburbias". A fourth of the congregation built Calvary in Allegheny City, now Pittsburgh's North Side). The other members built our sister church, First United Methodist Church in Shadyside. The remaining, only 154 people, pulled together their resources and raised over \$245,000 (almost \$6.2 million in today's dollars) to build a church of their own. In 1891 they bought a duck pond and a skating rink in Allegheny City which is the very land that Calvary United Methodist Church is sitting on today.

Calvary's organizers were prominent in commercial and professional activities of Pittsburgh. The first Board of Trustees included Joseph Horne, CB Shea, the Jones family, and the Scaife family. Joseph Horne, founder of Horne's department stores, was the chair of the Trustees for Calvary. Sadly he passed away a year and a half before the sanctuary was opened. CB Shea, Horne's financial partner, gave a personal note in the amount of \$62,000 for Calvary's construction. The Jones family, of Jones & Lauglin Steel, was responsible for the building of the Hot Metal Bridge. The Scaife Family were heirs to the Mellon banking, oil, and aluminum fortune.

The Trustees hired architect Thomas B. Wolfe. Born and raised in nearby Sewickley, Wolfe had worked for the Heinz family. He was sent to France for inspiration and returned with drawings that contained designs of the 13th Century Gothic Cathedral at Chartres, France. He designed Calvary as a "Parlor" Cathedral. A "Parlor"

Cathedral is patterned after European cathedrals but only 1/10th the size. In spring 1892, the Trustees also hired Louis Comfort Tiffany, a young, up-and-coming artist. They contracted him to create 189 windows for \$15,770 (almost \$400,000 in today's dollars.) This was Tiffany's largest and most expensive commission at the time. When the windows were installed in 1895, Calvary had three of the largest Tiffany windows in the world.

Bishop Fowler laid the cornerstones for both Calvary and its sister church in Shadyside on May 18, 1893. Although the first service at Calvary United Methodist Church was held on Christmas Eve 1893 in the chapel, the sanctuary would not be finished for another two years. The building was completed in June of 1895.

SPECIAL TIME FOR OUR CHILDREN

- In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be registered.
- 2 This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria.
- 3 All went to their own towns to be registered.
- 4 Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David.
- He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child.
- 6 While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child.

- And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth and laid him in a manger, because there was no place in the guest room.
- 8 Now in that same region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night.

Jesus was always pulling up a seat, saving space, making room for people, and he has made room for you. So come to this Table. Come with your faith and your doubt. Come with your questions and your hopes. Come with your grief and your love. Just come, because there is room for you here... This is Christ's table. All are welcome.

CALL TO CONFESSION

Leader:

Did you know that a version of the phrase, "Be not afraid" is written in scripture as many as 365 times? That's one for every day. God says, "Be not afraid." The angels say, "Be not afraid." Over and over again, we are told to not be afraid. Friends, that sentiment carries us into this moment of prayer. During the prayer of confession we are honest with God about the mess of our lives and we are met with God's grace. God does not meet us with anger. God does not hold a arudae. God does not keep score. Instead, God wraps us in mercy and holds us in love. So be not afraid, and join me in the prayer of confession.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

All:

Loving Christ, scripture tells us that you were born in a stable because there was no room in the inn. There was no room in the inn for a woman in need, no room in the inn for an innocent baby. Forgive us. .. We should have learned our lesson by now, but just as others turned their backs on you, we continue to turn our backs on one another. Teach us how to make room for one another. ... Teach us how to make room for you. Carve out space in our hearts to love as you love, for we do not want to build hostility here. We want to build your promised day. Guide us forward. With hope and honesty, we pray, Amen.

WORDS OF ASSURANCE

Leader: Friends, the angels say, "Be not afraid," but they also say, "Unto you a child is born." Christ is born for you. Christ walked this earth for you. Christ forgives you. That's what love does. It makes room. It offers grace. It learns your name.

PRAYER OF THANKSGIVING

Leader:

Holy God, we have been waiting a long time for this night—for the joy and the quiet of Christmas Eve, for the sound of the angel chorus, for the old familiar songs. We have carried weary hearts through the last four weeks of Advent, longing for the peace and hope of this night, and now we're finally here.

All:

So as we bow our heads, we offer you our most earnest and honest prayers, trustina that once again, you meet us where we are. So toniaht God, we say thank you for the things in our lives that spark joy: Thank you for the gift of family recipes and crowded tables. Thank you for a slower schedule, as many approach vacation. Thank you for infusing this season with practices of generosity. Thank you for the bells, and the songs, and the candles in the windows. Thank you for the children who squeal with joy, and the neighbors who drop off cookies. Thank you for every ounce of beauty that marks this season; it has made it possible for us to join our voices with the angel chorus.

Leader: However, God, even in the face of remarkable joy, we still bring weary and

worried hearts to you this night. Because we know that many have an empty seat at the table this year. We know that many will celebrate Christmas from a hospital room. We know that many have crunched numbers over and over again to see if they could afford a gift. We know that for far too many, the

holidays are a reminder that the world is still not as it should be.

All: So in between our joy and our weariness, God, we ask that you would make room. Pour yourself into the cracks of our hearts. Bind yourself to our good days

and our bad days. Carve out space for your love in the center of our beings so that no matter where we go we might trust the angels' song when they say, "Be

not afraid," and, "Joy to the world!"

Leader: Until then, until the day when joy overpowers weariness, until the day when there

is room for all at every table, until your promised day, we will continue to pray as

your son taught us to pray, saying:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory forever. Amen.
